ADVENT

“The Word became flesh and dwelt among us for a while (John 1:14, NIV).”

What does Christmas mean to you? If you're like most, it is a combination of things. As a child, a bit part of Christmas was the two-week vacation from school! Of course, a big bonus was the gift-giving – or shall I say, gift-receiving? ☺ The tree, decorations, lights and fake fireplace all added to the wonderland effect of the season. Of course, there was the story of Jesus' birth, but that was more of an add-on to all the other more important features of the holiday.

Each year I enjoy thumbing through a book by Dr. Paul Maier entitled, *The First Christmas, The True and Unfamiliar Story*. It is filled with cultural and historical details that escape our attention because of our higher priority of seeing the glittering Christmas decorations on homes, and the Honolulu City Lights at Honolulu Hale (City Hall.) As I was perusing this



book again, I came across the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem, which is believed to contain the cave or grotto where Jesus was born. The pictures are fascinating and unexpected. In very old-ish style, the adornments of the niche present a striking contrast of elegant simplicity and over-the-top ornamentation (at least to the Western eye.) The silver lanterns dangling from the ceiling remind me of the lighting and ceiling fan department of Home Depot!



Constantine during the 4th century AD had this condition as it purposed to overturn the pagan celebration Saturnalia. And we have it today in our Christmas season.

It is interesting that even in this shrine intended to preserve the identity of Jesus' birthplace, there seems to be an excess of sensory input. No doubt it is nothing like the manger where Jesus was born. There is a blend of a form of remembrance along with all we have added to it over time. The first celebrated “Christmas” by Emperor

Perhaps we shouldn't be surprised by this. When God sent his Son to dwell among us, He, Jesus Christ, was the God-Man who was tangible yet beyond comprehension. He was the Holy One who came to the fallen world. He combined the Sacred with the earthly. His presence sanctified all that He touched.

It is possible to become disenchanted and resentful of this sensory overload. Though it may be hard to accept and embrace, the reality is that this is how our Christmas is in our world. It is up to us to look deeper and recover the rich meanings of Christmas. This is not unlike those who lived long ago. So rather than complaining about a condition that won't go away, let's just periodically take the time to quiet our hearts and reflect and marvel of that first Advent. When we do, we have an assurance similar to the one God gave to Solomon by his father David: "If you seek Him, He will be found by you, but if you forsake Him, He will reject you forever (1 Chronicles 28:9, NIV)."

My prayer is that you will find not only the historical Jesus, but the living Jesus this Christmas. Merry Christmas!

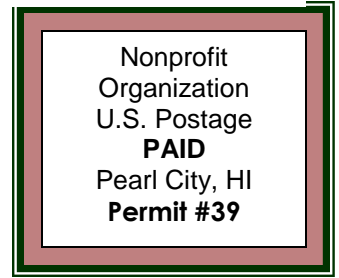
